Jesus Appears to His Disciples

- ¹⁹ On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁰ After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.
- ²¹ Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." ²² And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Jesus Appears to Thomas

- ²⁴ Now Thomas (also known as Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. ²⁵ So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"
- But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."
- ²⁶ A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."
- ²⁸ Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"
- ²⁹ Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." The Purpose of John's Gospel
- ³⁰ Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not recorded in this book. ³¹ But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.

Message

Seeing is Believing. A common expression. I'll believe it when I see it. Another common one. It's kind of a human reaction to the seemingly far-fetched. So is it any wonder that Thomas doubted? I think that he

got a bum rap. And even to this day, we might call someone a "doubting Thomas" and it's not a compliment.

The story implies that somehow Thomas is less than the others because he wanted to see Jesus before he could believe that he was risen. Would any of the other disciples have reacted any differently if they hadn't been in the room when Jesus showed up? They were there. They saw him. Easy for them to believe. I think Jesus understood that Thomas was just being the average human when he said, "Because you have seen me, you have believed."

Then Jesus went on to say, "blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." Which one are you? When I read of the lives of his followers, when I read of the conversion of Saul, when I read of all the good things that have happened in Jesus' name over the past 2,000 years, when I hear the testimony of the change in life of someone who has accepted Jesus, I believe whole-heartedly. If I had not seen all these things, would I still believe? Honestly, I don't know. And what would be the point anyway? However, logic tells me that none of it would have happened if Jesus had not risen. And so I believe. Even though my belief is a result of what I have seen, I feel blessed anyway.

I also continue to see the risen Christ in the world around me. Because of all this, even on those difficult days when I can't seem to see Christ anywhere, I don't doubt his presence. I only doubt my ability to see him.

There are days when my heart cries out, "Lord, show yourself to me." And I see images of times throughout history that his goodness prevailed. But that doesn't satisfy me. "Where are you today?" I cry. And his slideshow flashes through my mind's eye. I see food banks and women's shelters. I see Children's Aid and AA. I see Marjorie and Jim shopping for those who can't go out. I see my daughter, Katie, making up a care package for someone in need. I see Pat and Cheryl bringing Messy Church to children who might not otherwise hear the Good News. I see the Woodhouse congregation phoning each other to help lift their spirits through these difficult times. I see Dean Wells caring for his mother. I see Peter and Pam caring for a widow. I see long term care facilities offering care to those who can no longer live alone. I see women at both churches making up little gift bags for the congregations. I see the Lions Club supporting Guide Dogs and Rotary supporting Operation Eyesight. I see Church Out Serving and the many ways they serve. I see Habitat for Humanity. I see organizations advocating for the respectful and just treatment of those in minorities. I see fund-raising for research into debilitating and deadly diseases. And I hear a voice saying, "These are but a few of the billions of places I am." And I feel assured once again.

Yes, I'm one who needed to see to believe. Ok. I believe that Christ is risen. Then what? Is it enough to simply say, "I believe." If we believe that Christ is risen there has to more to it. There has to be a purpose. Ahhh, yes there is. Jesus said to the disciples, "As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." His ministry had included care for the elderly and infirm, equality for women and strangers, forgiveness of sins, compassion, benevolence, justice-seeking. So that is what we are called to do. It is not enough to say, "I believe" without living in the way of Christ. Now, I don't think we are all expected to live in communes as was described in our Acts reading. But we are still expected to share our resources to care for those in need. We are expected to care for one another.

The shut down of the church because of Covid makes it hard to support each other. Even when we were open for those few months last fall, we weren't allowed to socialize; we weren't allowed to hug. It is nigh on impossible to offer comfort when you have to maintain a 6' distance. And yet many found ways to stay in touch, to help each other out, to be Christ's presence for others. The Lift Up Your Spirit group found a way to lift up the spirits of over 130 households last week. Great work! Great ministry!

Corona Virus Hits Women the Hardest

The only break from physical and verbal abuse Jane* usually gets is when her husband leaves home at 7 a.m. for work. Each morning Jane is relieved when the door closes behind him, and in the afternoon she shores herself up for his return. Now, under lockdown, what Jane describes as "torment" is never-ending.

"I would count down the minutes until he left," she says. "Now, he's here all the time. I constantly walk on eggshells. I honestly don't know how much longer I can take it."

Jane isn't alone.

Under lockdown, women around the world are forced to stay in unsafe homes with abusive partners or parents. Closures of social service agencies means that services for survivors of gender-based violence are harder to access. In some parts of the world, violence against women is perpetrated by security agencies enforcing lockdowns.



In a recently published statement, "Gender, Faith and COVID-19", ACT Alliance, a coalition of 135 churches and church organizations across the world that includes The United Church of Canada, says women and girls are the

hardest hit by the virus. The organization calls on all governments to assess the gender-based impact of the pandemic so they can develop strategies to respond.

The role of women in caregiving is one of the many serious issues ACT raises. Across the globe, the majority of healthcare workers and caregivers are women, making them most susceptible to COVID-19. "The 'domestic' workforce, where women make up 70%, are more likely to be part of the frontline response. We advocate to our governments for coordinated responses that are sensitive to the needs of women and girls, where unpaid caregivers and community health workers are provided with adequate training, equipment, and livelihood support to respond effectively and keep themselves and their families safe," the report reads.

"She-cession" is the new term for the gender-based economic downtown precipitated by the virus. In many cases, the pandemic intensifies existing problems.

In a blog post, "Gendered Impacts of Coronavirus," the Canadian Women's Foundation reports that, in Canada, women carry more unpaid housework and caregiving responsibilities than men, including child and elder care. With school closures, women have to take on even more caregiving. Since women in general already earn less than men and are more likely to have part-time or precarious jobs, the current work interruptions have a greater impact on them.

Aware of the global impact of the COVID-19 virus on women, ACT Alliance encourages governments to not only respond to the immediate needs of women and girls but also to plan for the future: "Governments must plan and resource [their] response for the long term as the impacts will continue long after we have tackled the virus."
