Advent Candle Lighting Week 2 – JOY

We are three-quarters of the way through Advent. In the last two weeks, we have lit the candles of hope and peace. (Light 2 purple candles) In our culture, this is a time of consumer frenzy and, often, frazzled nerves. At this point many people are beginning to wish this season were already over. Not here. This is a different kind of place and we keep time to a different kind of music. Joy is the theme of this day.

What does joy look like?

Joy has many faces. You can notice it down at the community soup kitchen where people who don't have the money for a decent meal are singing Christmas carols while they wait for their lunch. Joy shines in the eyes of young children for whom the world is an adventure and a mystery and a promise. Sometimes joy shows up at the nursing home when old, familiar hymns stir precious memories or the beat of an old dance tune sets tired toes tapping. Joy can be there when a family gathers to say goodbye to one who has been much loved. It abides even when the heart is breaking for it is deeper than the troubles of the moment and it is stronger than grief. Scripture speaks of the creation time "when the morning stars sang together and all the heavenly beings shouted for joy" (Job 38:7)

What does joy feel like?

Joy does not feel like happiness, not exactly. We are happy when things are going our way and life is sweet. When things are not going our way and the taste of life is sour, we are unhappy. Joy is tougher than that. Joy can feel like a reason to get up in the morning, a purpose to guide us through our days. Joy feels like the sense that all is well, and that all will be well, and that all will be very well. Joy feels like the wonderful surprise that keeps us from sleepwalking through our lives and waits for us at the end of our days.

What is it like to live in joy?

Joy is often very quiet. It doesn't demand attention. It doesn't force itself on anyone. Joy loves company but can thrive in solitude as well. Joy changes things. It makes ordinary things special and ordinary people remarkable. Joy will sing with angels and with the out-of-tune person sitting beside you. Today we light the candle named Joy. Message

All those people from different walks of life were going to John and asking, "What should I do?" His answer boiled down to the same for all of them. It was: don't use your position of privilege or power for your own personal gain but share what you have with those who are without.

We hear that same message several times in the New Testament. It is really the key to following Jesus. And that's what I love about this time of year! I see and hear of people going out of their way to help others. Even our TV shows turn the grinches into caring souls. Like I said, that's what I love about this time of year.

What I love about being Christian is helping to make this time of year last all year. Each week when we hear the Minute for Mission, I am so proud to be a member of the United Church because they help make a difference to so many throughout the world. And I am even prouder to be a member of this pastoral charge because we provide almost \$20,000 support for that work. But we don't stop there. You have provided our Mission and Outreach committee with money to support local causes as well. It gets even better! We have people in Grace church that also donate their time and talents so that Church Out Serving and our local food bank can indeed serve those in need. Then there's your regular donations to the food bank, donations of socks, seniors helping seniors...the list goes all through the year. Like I said, that's what I like about being Christian.

Being a Christian at this time of year fills me with such joy. To think that God came to us in the birth of a child to simple parents! They weren't in positions of privilege or power; they were just common folk. They couldn't have known then the range and intensity of emotion that Jesus would be the source of. He would be a source for anger, jealousy, hate, confusion, and fear. But the lasting emotion he stirred in others was love. For anyone who wanted to receive his love, he was there. What joy! Two thousand years later, the story is the same. Anyone who wants to receive his love, is loved. The joy lives on.

Today we celebrate the theme of joy. We lit the pink candle, thinking of Mary. When I think of Jesus as an infant, I think of that song, Mary Did You Know? No mother, as they look at the infant in their arms, can know what kind of person that child will become. I think every mother has hopes for her child and most can influence the child as it grows to some extent, but you never know. I wonder what some mothers thought when their babies were born. Mothers of people such as Walter Gretzky, Bill Gates, Lois Wilson, Mother Theresa, Frederick Banting... people who made a difference for a lot of others; some achieving fame that will last for generations to come, some for only one or two.

And there are many more people throughout our history that never became famous at all but they, too, made a difference to others. As mothers, grandmothers, and aunties, we watch our little ones grow into adulthood not knowing for sure where their journeys will take them. But we must have faith that if we model a Christian life and

explain why we do what we do, they will feel called to follow in Christ's footsteps.

It is an even greater individual responsibility for the generation today. When we were young, we had Sunday School where we learned the stories of Jesus and the way to be a good Christian. Sunday School was still there for many of our children and maybe even some of our grandchildren. But very few Sunday Schools are functioning anymore. It is difficult to have a class of one... even two or three, especially if they are siblings. So it is up to us to influence the present generations.

As you know, there can be some very joyful occasions when you realize that a child "gets it." This time of year, I always remember the Christmas when my daughter was 13. She had a few people that she always got presents for. She picked them out; I paid for them. Well, that had been our practice for years. But this particular year things were really tight financially. I knew that I couldn't afford to do that. As it was, I wasn't even going to be able to spend what I usually did on her. So I explained that to her. Then I said, "I've got \$100. Do you want me to spend it all on you or do you want me to give you some of it now so that you can buy presents for other people?" I'll never forget the joy I felt when she chose to receive fewer presents herself so that she could give to others. I thought that was pretty remarkable for a 13-year-old.

As I said, we must teach them the way. Just like those who came to John the Baptist. They don't know what's right if nobody tells them. It is critical that this generation learn the responsibility we have to help care for those who are unable to provide for themselves. I pray that some sort of movement will start. It seems that, at this time, young people are crusading for our environmental well-being. That's great. It needs to happen. But they also need to be aware that empty stomachs need more than clean air. They need to learn how to use their positions of privilege and power (which many have even as children) to build a just society. It is our responsibility to teach them what John the Baptist had to say:

Share your food and clothing with those who have none
The price is the price. Don't pad the bill for personal profit.
Don't use your position to extort money and don't make false
accusations to make your own position better; be content

with the compensation that comes with your position. How do we teach these messages? By example. What we say and do in front of children and youth will influence what kind of citizen they become. Praise them when they say or do something that helps make the world more just for those who suffer. If they are visiting you, set your donation for the food bank on the counter and tell them what it's for. Talk to them about a situation where someone can not be all that they can be because they are lacking something. Then discuss ways that you could help. Be sure to teach them as well that not all situations are about money. There are times when their own time or talent can make a big difference for someone else.

Again, I encourage you to teach by example, communicating the reasons you are doing whatever it is. And I would also encourage you to say more than just "because Jesus says we should." Tell the why of it as well. You will have the joy of sharing this time together and even greater joy when you see them do for others all on their own. Amen.

Minute for Mission Social Distancing is a luxury

COVID-19 is striking Zimbabwe when it's down. Roughly a year after being ravaged by Cyclone Idai and two years into a drought, Zimbabweans haven't had time to recover between tragedies. "COVID-19 comes when a number of situations are not very good for Zimbabwe. The economy is completely dysfunctional. This month, the inflation rate is about 600 percent. Health institutions are not working, and the doctors have been on strike for six months now. This crisis is a disaster for Zimbabwe," says Kenneth Mtata, General Secretary of the Zimbabwe Council of Churches.

Food shortages in Zimbabwe make enforcing lockdown rules difficult. Riot police have been called in to control crowds in food markets. Kenneth Mtata explains that people want to comply with lockdown. "But 85 percent of the population is in informal employment. They can't afford to miss work a single day. People are saying it would be better to die of coronavirus than hunger. This puts them in conflict with the state."

In 1980, Zimbabwe was liberated from British rule and then endured the ruthless dictatorship of Robert Mugabe, who was president of the country from 1987 to 2017.

Having suffered decades of trauma and tragedy, and now facing a deadly virus, hope can be hard to come by. "We celebrate 40 years of independence in Zimbabwe [on April 18]. We don't know if it's a day of celebration or of mourning for the lost years," says Mtata.

A Mission & Service partner, the Zimbabwe Council of Churches has always advocated for social cohesion, good governance, active citizenship, economic justice, and youth empowerment. Now, the needs are more urgent than ever.

"We are pushing the government to reengage doctors and nurses and to provide them with personal protective equipment," says Mtata. "We have also been focusing on communication, encouraging people to take preventative measures. We are working to meet the needs of families who can't afford to be in this lockdown situation."
