Global, International, National and World Forgiveness Days

Global Forgiveness Day is held on July 7. It is also referred to as "World Forgiveness Day" and "National Forgiveness Day".

International Forgiveness Day is held on the first Sunday of August Forgiveness Day is a time to forgive and to be forgiven. If you dig deeply, you will discover that there are a number of other "Forgiveness" days, created by primarily religious organizations, or organized groups promoting the concept of forgiveness. There's enough trouble and strife in the world. The existence of multiple forgiveness days can only help to make the world and your life a little better. The sponsors of this day believe that a little more forgiveness will help to make the world a much better place.

All of the holidays promoting forgiveness, have one thing in common: to forgive and forget wrongs. Put aside the grudges. Bury the hatchet. And, end the feuds. Life is too short to hold in the pain and anxiety. Instead, forgive people and you will find your life is calmer, and more peaceful. Forgiveness goes both ways. While much of the focus of these days encourages you to forgive others, it is also important to seek forgiveness to both God and others, for any wrongs you have done.

Global Forgiveness Day began in 1994. It was created and is sponsored by the Christian Embassy of Christ's Ambassadors. This holiday originated in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada.

International Forgiveness Day was created by the World Forgiveness Alliance, a non-denominational, educational foundation.

Do your part. Use the day or any day for that matter to clear your conscience and your soul. Take a few moments to sincerely forgive someone and to ask forgiveness of others. If possible, make it public. That way forgiveness will spread.

Jemima has gone back to Teacher's College to get her diploma in teaching which will bring her to a higher level & more pay. She has been teaching at her local school off & on during this pandemic. Her older brother wanted her to stay home & look after their mentally disabled mother but I e-mailed her, encouraged her to take her diploma course & earn more money & even get a better teaching job & she could help her mother by buying her some food. She has been enjoying teaching school & told me she has a gift in mentoring the students. She says there has never been a best candidate from her local school but this past year she was made class manager & produced 12 candidates who are to join National School in July & has been ranked Best Teacher of Mathematics & Social Studies in their zone & was given a certificate. Jemima was first brought into Robin's Nest by me while I was there in 2012. Her younger brother & 2 sisters were 3 of the children at the orphanage. Susan [Gr 8 student when I was there in 2012] is now the Robin's Nest Social Worker. Allan [who we also sponsor] & a couple other students have gone to mud huts of the elderly & have repaired them so they are sturdier & the rain

Robin has a transition home in the same building as her office now & the young people stay there when they are on school holidays. They all take part in Sunday morning worship. Robin has sewing courses for them, also self esteem & empowerment courses & they learn how to say NO to sex & why , re: pregnancies & sexually transmitted diseases. She has also had students graduate from hairdressing, medical records, early childhood education, tailoring program & others are studying in other programs.

Please call me even if you could help for 1 month, lets help JEMIMA get through & be an independent woman & help her family & community.

"He's the one who taught me carpentry," he said. "I wouldn't be in this business if it weren't for him. He spent a lot of time teaching me things he thought were important. Mom, I'll be there for the funeral," Jack said.

As busy as he was, he kept his word. Jack caught the next flight to his hometown. Mr. Belser's funeral was small and uneventful. He had no children of his own, and most of his relatives had passed away.

The night before he had to return home, Jack and his Mom stopped by to see the old house next door one more time. Standing in the doorway, Jack paused for a moment. It was like crossing over into another dimension, a leap through space and time. The house was exactly as he remembered.

Every step held memories. Every picture, every piece of furniture...Jack stopped suddenly...

Mission and Outreach Update

M&O has been working with Haldimand- Norfolk Women's Services to identify the greatest needs for the women and children in their care. We have provided \$2,000 of funding from the TLC fund to provide \$50 Walmart and PC cards so that their clients, who are starting with nothing, can purchase what they need



most. The Women's Shelter also asked for outdoor activity and game equipment and we have received tennis rackets, badminton rackets and some funds which we are using to purchase a badminton/volleyball net and game set and an outdoor playpen. These items have now been delivered to the Shelter to provide children with some safe outdoor activities.

Pikangikum New Hope Bike program Expanded!

The highly successful bike program at Pikangikum is continuing this summer with 5 local staff hired to run the bike repair shop and bike ride program again this summer. The program provides bikes, bike repair training and summer ride programs. The Rotary Club of Norfolk Sunrise has been involved with the program since its inception when they helped fund the bike trailer outfitted as a bike repair shop. You may recall Jim and Marjorie took bikes and skates in the trailer up to



Pikangikum over the winter road in 2019. This program has been so successful that OPP is seconding one of their officers, Adam Belanger full time by the OPP to expand the program into other First Nations communities.
