⁷ Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. ⁹ This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. ¹⁰ This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹ Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.

¹³ This is how we know that we live in him and he in us: He has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world. ¹⁵ If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in them and they in God. ¹⁶ And so we know and rely on the love God has for us.

John 15:1-8 New International Version The Vine and the Branches

15 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener.² He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes^[a] so that it will be even more fruitful.³ You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you.⁴ Remain in me, as I also

remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me.

⁵ "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶ If you do not remain in me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned. ⁷ If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸ This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples.

Message

May the words of my mouth and the meditations of our hearts be pleasing in God's sight.

This is mental health awareness week. The objective of Mental Health Week is to shift societal beliefs and perceptions about mental health. It helps promote behaviours and attitudes that foster well-being, support good mental health and create a culture of understanding and acceptance.

In Jesus' day, and beyond, mental illness was thought to be devil possession. Even in our lifetime, mental illness has been misunderstood. Yes, there are a few illnesses that require institutionalization, but there are millions of people who are able to manage their illness, depending on what it is, with medication, cognitive therapy, and/or other healthy practices. Yet they keep their illness a secret because there is still a stigma that goes with mental illness.

Mad, sad, glad, and scared. Those are the emotions we're born with. And we all experience all of them at different times in our lives. But when one is stronger than the others for an extended time, things don't go quite as they should. Our lives feel out of control. That's when we especially need our brothers and sisters in Christ.

What can we do? Love. Love, as is written in our scripture today. Bear good fruit. Love, compassion, support, acceptance. We are called to love and support our brother or sister who has a mental illness just as

much as the one who has, say, diabetes. It is with that love and support that you accompany someone through mental illness to mental health. It isn't always easy. In fact, sometimes it's really difficult. Be loving and supportive anyway. After all, Christ never said that bearing good fruit would always be easy.

Which brings us to the reading from 1 John. Verse 19 says we love because he first loved us. As I mentioned before, we are born with the emotions of mad, sad, glad, and scared. Love and hate are learned. We learn love from God. Lynda shared with us in verse 20, "Whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother and sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen." Those are pretty strong words. Yet they are words that have been ignored by millions... trillions...bjillions in the past 2,000 years. Think of all the wars. Think of all the violent crime. Think of all the hunger and homelessness. Think of all the unkind words. To love God is to love God's people. I believe that means not only all denominations of Christians but all people. How better can we model Christ than to be loving to all?

Being loving does not mean being a door mat or agreeing all the time. But we can speak our truth in love. Think of when you are dealing with children. You don't give them everything they want. You don't give them things that could be harmful to them. You don't give them what you can't afford. Yet, because you withhold things it doesn't mean that you don't love them.

Christians have a lot of ground to make up for. Hopefully all churches who follow the lectionary are hearing this same message today. Love. Love unconditionally. You don't necessarily have to like everything about someone. That wouldn't be realistic. We are individuals, each with our own sense of what is right and wrong; each with our own system of values. But whether we like someone or not, we must love them. That means treating them as we would want to be treated. That means not wishing for them what we would not wish for ourselves. Those are branches that grow from the vine we hear about in the Gospel reading today. The vine that is grounded in God. It won't be easy.

I'd like to share a writing that Mother Theresa had on the wall in Calcutta:

Mother Teresa's Anyway Poem

People are often unreasonable, illogical and self centered;

Forgive them anyway.

If you are kind, people may accuse you of selfish, ulterior motives; Be kind anyway.

If you are successful, you will win some false friends and some true enemies;

Succeed anyway.

If you are honest and frank, people may cheat you;

Be honest and frank anyway.

What you spend years building, someone could destroy overnight; Build anyway.

If you find serenity and happiness, they may be jealous;

Be happy anyway.

The good you do today, people will often forget tomorrow; Do good anyway.

Give the world the best you have, and it may never be enough;

Give the world the best you've got anyway.

You see, in the final analysis, it is between you and your God;

It was never between you and them anyway.

And that's what it boils down to. God is the gardener. If our motivators are love and justice, we should bear good fruit.

Let us pray:

Help us in our living to be loving toward all your people, even the unlikable ones. Help us to follow the teachings of Jesus in our daily living. Please fill us with your love and grace. Amen.

Florence Gava is a grandmother. She lives in a small community in Zimbabwe where she looks after her grandchildren. Recently, a series of challenging events has pushed her whole family to the edge.
