²⁵ "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? ²⁶ Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? ²⁷ Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life[[]? ²⁸ "And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. ²⁹ Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. ³⁰ If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you you of little faith? 31 So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' ³² For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. ³³ But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

Anthem

Message

Thanksgiving...we have so much to be thankful for! Yes, in the past year there have been many disappointments and difficulties. There will be every year. That's part of life. And it's a part of life that, if we let him, God will help us through. So we should probably start by thanking God for God.

In the gospel of Matthew, we heard Jesus say that we are not to worry about food. Well, in Canada, there is so much food that about 64% of adults over 18 and 30% of children aged 5-17 are overweight or obese.

Plus, we waste up to 40% of our food. For those with financial troubles, we have meal programs and food banks. No one has to starve in Canada and yet **One out of every six children under the age of 18 suffers from food insecurity.** This is most prevalent in Northern Canada. As for around the world, more than enough food is produced to feed the global population—but as many as 811 million people still go hungry. We must be thankful that we live in Canada and that we have the means to help feed people who are starving.

Jesus also said that we are not to worry about having something to drink. Well, in Canada, we have almost 1/5 of the world's fresh water. That sounds great, but over 82,000 people in Canada do not have access to clean and healthy drinking water. We must be thankful for our abundance of clean water and for our right to lobby the government to do something for the communities whose water is contaminated. Clothes are also something Jesus said we are not to worry about. According to one study, Canadians spend an average of 6% of their income on clothing and accessories. I don't know about you, but I always seem to end up with at least half of my closet filled with clothes that I don't wear anymore. The nice thing is that I can donate them to someplace that gives them away or sells them cheaply. And, of course, for those in severe poverty, there are campaigns such as our "Sock It To Me" that provide the necessities. Internationally there are some interesting stories. First there is Nicaragua, the largest country in Central America. Nearly 80 percent of Nicaraguans live on less than \$2 a day. Many are just scraping by, with no excess money to spend on clothes. Since this is a warm weather area, people do not need sweaters and winter clothes, but poverty makes it difficult for them to buy even the basic shirts, pants, dresses, and shoes. Then there are countries such as Nigeria who have banned the import of second-hand clothing hoping that it will boost the textile industry and therefore jobs. We must be thankful that we have enough clothing for each season and access to used clothing when there is a need.

Those are the three that Jesus mentioned but there is so much more, as

Canadians in south-western Ontario, to be thankful for.

Healthcare. I can remember when, before the Employer Health Tax, when each person had to pay for their own Ontario Health Insurance Plan. If you didn't have OHIP, you had to pay your own medical expenses. Now we can be thankful that if anyone in our province needs medical attention, it is not contingent upon their ability to pay.

Employment. Ontario's unemployment rate was 9.6% in 2020. Burkina Faso's, a country in west Africa, was 77%, Syria 50%. We can be thankful for income protection such as Employment Insurance and Ontario Works.

Peer Support. We can be thankful for groups such as AA, TOPS, and Al-Anon

Democracy. We can be thankful that we are free to peacefully express our opinions and make most of our own decisions.

Freedom of Religion. We can celebrate our faith without fear of persecution. For that we must be thankful.

Natural beauty. We live in a beautiful part of the world. We can enjoy lakes, rivers, woods, trails, fields, the falls...all within driving distance. We must give thanks for our easy access to this beauty.

Family and friends. What would we do without them? We give thanks for the many ways they amuse, comfort, and support us.

Music. No matter what genre of music we like, we are free to listen to it. We can give thanks for the ears to hear it with.

These are just some of the things we can be thankful for today. Some of you will even be thankful that this is the end of my message. Amen.

Street-Involved People Are Especially Vulnerable

"By protecting the underserved community, we protect everybody in the community." - A Mission & Service—supported community centre serving Greater Victoria's most vulnerable, *Our Place* is bracing for COVID-19 to strike. Grant McKenzie, the Communications Director at Our Place, predicts that more support from paramedics will be needed in the near future if the virus spreads.

"This population is especially vulnerable to being hit extremely hard by COVID-19 because so many of them already have underlying health issues. When you struggle every day, wondering where you're going to sleep at night and where your next meal is coming from, you only access health services when it's life or death," says McKenzie. "By protecting the underserved community, we protect everybody in the community. It's so very easy for our delicate health system to become overrun—and if COVID-19 runs amok in this population, we'll hit the tipping point that much harder."

For over 50 years, Our Place has served Greater Victoria's most vulnerable people: working poor, impoverished elderly, mentally and physically challenged, addicted, and homeless. Even though Our Place has had to close its

with provincial health guidelines, it continues to help those who rely on their services.

"There is a lot of fear around what happens when this virus makes its way to the people we serve. But our dedicated staff isn't about to abandon them. We know that there is going to be so much help that our family members need, especially when it comes to nutrition, hygiene, and a place to live. While we have had to close access to the building, we are still serving up to 1,400 meals a day, handing out 1,200 bottles of water, and offering paramedic services. We are working hard," says McKenzie.
