#### Anthem

### Message

This is the fourth week that we have heard from the book of James. I like James. The author gives very clear instructions about how Christians should live. In today's reading, he talks of two sources of wisdom to inform your conduct — one from God and one not from God (or earthly). He even tells you how to tell the two apart. If the wisdom is from God it will have these features: pure; peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. However, if your thoughts or deeds lack consideration of others, if they are chiefly concerned with a desire to achieve personal profit or pleasure, you are using earthly wisdom.

James is writing to people who already know about Jesus, so his messages are not about becoming Christian, they are about being Christian. His audience, then, was very similar to the churches of today in that they were people who profess to follow Jesus. James was written about 30 years after Jesus' death, so probably most of the congregants converted to Christianity from another belief system, whereas most of our congregants were born and raised in the Christian faith. Yet we have a moment similar to their conversion moment. It is Confirmation or Adult Baptism. Those are occasions when one takes on responsibility for one's own life as a Christian.

James gives us lots of instructions about what life as a Christian should be like. Here's the problem. Many make the decision to join the church either because they are expected to (much like going to post secondary education) or because they feel a strong movement of the Spirit, but then they find that living as followers of Jesus is difficult. So they leave the church. Why? What is so hard about being a Christian? First, let me go back in our history. The church could be very unforgiving. You mess up; you get excommunicated. It's still very much like that in some denominations today. It was sometimes too hard to live up to those standards. Then there were wars against those with other beliefs. There was slavery. There were many occasions when you had to follow the leader rather than your own conscience. If you didn't

accept the party line, you were labelled a heretic. So the church was saying one thing but doing another. Some left because of the hypocrisy. It was too confusing and too frustrating.

And it was not the way of Christ. He taught forgiveness. He taught acceptance of all people. He taught peace.

Have we gone too far the other way when we forgive everything and accept everything? If so, then where are all the people? Are they thinking, "I don't have to go to church because I am forgiven and accepted by God just as I am"? That may or may not be true, but they are definitely not Christian. How can they be, when they are not learning what being a Christian is all about? It isn't just about where they spend their Sunday mornings. It is so much more. It is the lessons you hear each week. It is the application of those lessons in your everyday lives.

So why do those who, with genuine enthusiasm, join the church later leave. It may be lack of support. It may be lack of example. So I ask, "What is a Christian?" My answer is, "One who follows Christ." But that is easier said than done. What does living in a way that follows Christ look like? It isn't just keeping the 10 commandments. After all, 9 of the 10 of them are about what you shall not do. Being a Christian is so much more. Following Christ is about what you should or even must do. The book of James offers guidance for Christian living. Yes, sometimes it's tough. I know that you know that.

In our society today, some of the toughest decisions are financial. You ask yourself, "How much is the right amount for me to give to support the church and its ministries?" Then, over and above that, there are special appeals from the church and others ...Mission & Service, Lenten Offering, Women's Shelter, Foodgrains, Church Out Serving, Food Bank, the beggar on the city street, the Cancer Society, world disasters, and so on.

It's also tough to put others' needs ahead of your own wants. The healthy functioning of the church and its ministries is an example. To maintain the building and offer worship services and programs requires

not only money, but bodies. Whatever your gifts and skills, you must share them...with the church, with society, somewhere, some way. Here is a way that you involve your child or grandchild that is not involved in a church at this time. Bring them with you to help in a project. You will be setting a good example and helping them to feel comfortable in that setting.

Then, of course, there is a myriad of moral dilemmas in our day to day living. Something would be beneficial to you but is not necessarily due to you and costs somebody else in some way...how do you respond? I recently had somebody make something for me, something I had asked for. It cost him time and money. But he didn't want to charge me for it. Finally, he told me to make a donation to the church. That was a solution that made us both feel good. It was morally acceptable. I could know that I hadn't taken unfair example of my position. I had another instance where a group tried to pay me for something small that I had done for them. The gesture was a surprise and I certainly appreciated it, but it would not have been morally right for me to accept it. I have found over the years that if I ignore the feeling that something is not quite morally right, I later regret it. Often the decision needs to be guided by Jesus message today, "Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all."

Back to James. The book has a lot of instruction for the person who wants to be a faithful follower of Jesus. We'll actually hear a little more next week. I will finish this message with the last line we heard from our reader today... "Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Come near to God and he will come near to you". What a joyous promise. Amen.

# Mission & Service Partners Risk Jail on Easter Sunday

On Easter Sunday, members of Mission & Service partner advocacy groups\* based in the Philippines risked going to jail to advocate for those wrongfully imprisoned. When they demonstrated against the unlawful imprisonment of members arrested in peaceful protests just 12 days earlier, they knew they might well face a similar fate on Christianity's holiest day. The Easter demonstration took place in Sitio San Roque, an informal settlement for the urban poor in Manila, the site of the original protest that was launched to demand the government help people who are starving as a result of COVID-19 lockdowns.

Bail was set at an astronomical amount, almost \$900 Canadian (15,000 pesos). Though bail was posted by supporters, the 21

protestors still face charges.

During their Easter Sunday demonstration, Mission & Service partners protested the violent arrests, expressing concern that Philippino President Rodrigo Duterte is weaponizing laws to crush democratic decent.

"My orders to the police and military...if there is trouble or the situation arises where your life is on the line, shoot them dead. Understand? Dead. I'll send you to the grave.... Don't test the government," Duterte said in a national address.

So far, police claim that over 120,000 Filipinos have been arrested or warned for disobeying quarantine rules.

"We have been writing a lot of statements and making our positions known about the way the government has responded to this crisis because our president is talking about killing people who take to the streets," says Bishop Reuel Norman Marigza, General Secretary of the National Council of Churches in the Philippines. "We are saying that the government should be caring and compassionate, do mass testing, and make sure food is received by people who need it most." Bestang Sarah Dekdeken, Secretary General of the Cordillera Peoples Alliance(opens in a new tab) (CPA), a Mission & Service partner, claims that authorities are punishing her organization for helping the poor. "The military and police are telling people not to receive food donations we are distributing to the poor and vulnerable negatively impacted by COVID-19. They are saying we are terrorists or communists. They are doing this through social media," she says.

Undeterred, the Cordillera Peoples Alliance is continuing to reach out to those in need, distributing face masks to front line workers and giving food to people who are hungry. Since March 20, CPA has distributed food to over 683 families. Dekdeken says that while the urban poor, stranded students, farmers, and people who are sick are the immediate priority, the organization has to look ahead, too: "We are promoting community gardening now because we want to help people secure food beyond the COVID-19 crisis."
